

We're very pleased to report that we have reinvigorated the activities of the Bledlow Ridge Athletic Club (BRAC). BRAC's objective is to promote the use of the Meadow Stiles Playing Fields for sport and is the organisation that leases the playing fields from the Trustees and ensures that the affiliated clubs adhere to the terms of the lease.

BRAC has been largely dormant for the past few years, but has an important role in taking care of land management, cost sharing between the clubs and liability insurance. We are also bringing the Cricket and Tennis clubs closer together to work on joint projects such as improving the car park, resiting the defibrillator so it is more accessible, and the entrance signs that now advise visitors what matches are coming up. Graham Grose has kindly agreed to be the Chairman of BRAC, and Dave Wells (BRCC Chairman), Ben Lawrence (BRTC Chairman), Humphrey Grimmett and Dirmuid Jennings make up the remainder of the management committee. Country Notes

Summer weather arrived briefly and for a while the air was filled with the scent of freshly cut hay and lime tree flowers.

Marbled white butterflies and six-spot burnet moths flitted about knapweed flowers. Squirrels tore strips of bark from the base of tree trunks to get at the sap, it is damaging so let's hope they turn their attention to nuts soon. With fewer butterflies around this year it's a chance to admire moths which have delicately beautiful markings on their wings. They are important pollinators especially at night when bees are not active. Swallows, swifts and house martins skim low over fields and swirl high in the sky, feeding well before the autumn migration back to Africa.



News from West Wycombe Parish Council

Unfortunately this month's report from West Wycombe Parish Council must begin on a disappointing and frustrating note. You may remember that our Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign

(MVAS) was the subject of persistent thefts of the rechargeable batteries used to power it.

Having been with the manufacturers Swarco for some considerable time, whilst they sought to find a way to make the unit more secure, we finally retook possession of the unit at the start of July. It was put back in place on a lamp-post facing traffic entering West Wycombe from the Pedestal roundabout on a Friday evening - on the Sunday it was had stopped working, and that same day we received a report that the solar-powered VAS on Chorley Road opposite the entrance to the allotments had been vandalised. On inspection our worst fears were confirmed - the batteries from both units had been stolen. We will now have to look at further measures to try to make these theft-proof, but this may prove impossible. We know that speeding traffic across the parish is a real bugbear for our residents, and using these VASs had seemed to help mitigate the problem, but the constant risk of their being damaged in this way, and the expense and time required to replace the stolen items, may mean that

we have to give up on using them.

Recent visitors to the churchyard of St Lawrence at the top of West Wycombe Hill will have noticed that it has been looking very overgrown. This was reported to us, and we have been pressing Buckinghamshire Council to address the issue. Residents will be aware that there is a supplementary charge included in their council tax bills specifically for the maintenance and upkeep of the churchyard, so we have insisted that we should see some return on that expenditure. At time of writing we have been told that a cut will take place within the next week (mid-July) so by the time you read this we hope that the churchyard is looking better kept, but please do continue to report any concerns to the Clerk so that these can be passed on to Buckinghamshire Council for a response.

Whilst on the subject of things overgrown, our thanks must go to Peter Towersey of The Chiltern Society who went 'above and

beyond' and cleared the footpath across the bridge over the railway tracks on the north side of West Wycombe Road, next to RH Automotive. This was a task further complicated by the efforts of (we assume) Network Rail whose team had cut back the larger bushes and trees but not the dense grass, and had simply left the arisings in situ for Peter to work around.

At time of writing the planned walkway closures in West Wycombe have recently begun; whilst we accept that the work being carried out is necessary and to the longterm benefit of the village, we understand and share the frustration that the necessary restrictions on parking and access have created. Buckinghamshire Councillors Darren & Orshi Hayday have been working hard to iron out some of the issues that have arisen from this, but ultimately the Parish Council is in the same situation as village residents and business owners, of having to 'grin and bear it'. The Parish Council has made the burial ground car park behind St Paul's Church available as alternative parking for residents during the period of the closures, though vehicles will need to be moved for any interments. We sincerely hope that the work is completed to schedule and that by the time the next issue of Contact arrives all will be returned to normal.

Further credit should go to the two Buckinghamshire Councillors Hayday who, after 5 years of persistence managed to get the resurfacing of Beechwood Road onto the schedule of work. Despite some confusion over dates and times - a seeming inevitability when it comes to communications from Buckinghamshire Council's highways team and contractors! - the work was successfully completed at the start of July. Following the annual inspection of the play equipment at the Pedestal Playing Field, Cllrs Neil Harris and Simon Cope carried out repairs to the rope bridge that were identified as being necessary. The inspection report also highlighted that the bench near the table tennis table should be fixed in place, so this was done at the same time. In order to ensure that we are effectively monitoring the play equipment for signs of wear and tear, the Parish Council has now engaged Acorn Landscaping to carry out regular inspections across the year - weekly during the spring and summer when the equipment is used more heavily, less often in the autumn and winter months.

Finally, it cannot have escaped the notice of readers of this report that there has been a change of government in the UK, and of MP in Wycombe. Whilst West Wycombe . Parish Council is staunchly non-partypolitical, we can express our hope that our new MP will work hard for the benefit of all her constituents, and thank our outgoing MP (and local resident) Steve Baker for his service. 
