Letter from your church

When I sat down to write this, a car fitted with one of those gun exhausts, thoughtlessly blasted its way up the A40. Which got me thinking about silence, or to be more precise, different types of silence, what it might mean, and why meaningful silence seems so hard to find.

There was for me, two weeks ago, the silence, for example, that greeted the final switching off of the plane's engines, that moment of relief when one's holiday flight has landed safely, before that mad dash of standing up and fighting to get things out of the lockers. Then there is that odd, almost cloth-like silence you get in the middle of the night, when you wake up and can't get back to sleep. Probably the worst silence of all is that moment when a loved one finally passes away, when suddenly the breath stops, the mouth falls open, and they are gone.

But there are wonderful silences too. A frosty night, being somewhere without the noise of cars or planes, or more profoundly, the silence of peace after war. Something longed for in Gaza, Ukraine or Sudan - the silence of peace - something also held in our national memory as we commemorate soon

Remembrance Day.

We've been trying an experiment at St Botolph's church in Bradenham, recently. Called the 5.48 Space, it's a meditation hour at 48 minutes to 6 every Sunday in which we value silence. An hour in which people can come in, say a prayer or simply gather themselves for the week ahead, and go, spending 5 minutes or 50. It's not always silence; sometimes we play a little music or use the Calm app to do some guided meditation. It hasn't always worked; sometimes I'm there by myself for the whole hour but at other times people pop in. I say "alone" but of course, there's always someone else there, hovering about. Sometimes he speaks; sometimes he doesn't. Sometimes I forget to listen.

Occasionally, I'm cross with him for being so silent – why, when there is so much wrong, won't he speak up? Then I realise he's probably cross with me too – for the same reason. Then, sometimes, when I don't expect it, He or She or It does speak. I don't always understand but I listen.

In 1942, firemen uncovering the ruins of a bombed out house in Coventry found a family that had been trapped underground in the cellar for three days. As the mother, father and child were taken out alive, a fireman noticed the words they had scratched on the wall "We believe in the Light, although it be Dark. We believe in Peace although it be War. We believe in God although He be silent."

I suppose that's what it's all about really, believing there is something in the Silence.

Key Improvements:

- I. Complete Redecoration: The hall has undergone a full redecoration, giving the interior a fresh, inviting appearance.
- 2. Roof Replacement: A new flat roof has been installed at the front of the hall, ensuring better protection from the elements.

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The Ridge Evening WI

At our August meeting, Mike Dewey gave us a presentation on four INSPIRING WOMEN "Ordinary people of High Wycombe who did extraordinary things"!

Aleck Stacey came from humble beginnings but at a time when social mobility was improving. He was a successful coal merchant, sharp enough to realise the potential for the empty returning coal lorries to have an additional use. He arranged for them to collect offcuts of timber from numerous furniture factories which he turned into sawdust, wood flour, which he then had made into the popular linoleum. His successful entrepreneurial business ventures enabled him to generously invest in many local projects - the Electronic Cinema, Public Swimming Baths and as Mayor to give in perpetuity to the mayoral office an 18ct gold and jewel chain.

Frank Adams had to overcome the tragic loss of his father leaving his widow to rear their six children alone. Leaving school at 12 and while completing a photographic apprenticeship, Frank began successfully playing football both here and abroad. However, he returned to his beloved Wycombe Wanderers; with time out forced by WWII, and continued to play until his 1928 retirement. Equally successful in his sports goods and photographic business, and working as a land agent for Lord Carington, Frank purchased Loakes Park from him and subsequently donated the grounds to Wycombe Wanderers.

Jacob Ivanovitch Popp was born in Estonia, then Russia, to wealthy parents. Sadly his mother was shot during the revolution and he moved to England at age 18. An educated man with eight languages, he was a courier for Thomas Cook. He set up a newsagent, sweet and tobacconists shop in High Wycombe and after six years began Sunday Trading, breaking a law of Charles 11. The police chose to prosecute Mr Popp and for eight years he traded on a Sunday and every Monday received a summons and paid a fine. The free publicity boosted his business as did the sale of some 12,000 comic postcards he had printed illustrating his experiences as a cheerful martyr!

Frederick Youens, born 1892, won a scholarship to the Royal Grammar School where he excelled at his studies and drama. Awarded a scholarship to attend Oxford University his plans were interrupted by the outbreak of war. He was posted as a second lieutenant and was serving in this capacity when, out on patrol, he was wounded and had to return to his trenches to have his wounds dressed. Then, regardless of his injuries, he set out to rally the team of a Lewis gun. A bomb fell on that position without exploding and Lieutenant Youens picked it up and threw it back to German lines: a second bomb then fell and he picked it up, intending to throw it too, but it exploded in his hand and he subsequently died from his wounds. At the tender age of 24, he became High Wycombe's only homegrown holder of the Victoria Cross.

The talk was very well received as were the many photographs of old Wycombe and its people.

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Bledlow Ridge Horticultural Society

Started in the early 1950's, the Annual Bledlow Ridge Horticultural Society Show is a traditional fixture in the Village calendar. It's not a case of winning a class or a trophy but of taking part, and we are very encouraged that members and others are keeping the tradition alive by putting in exhibits..... but we could always do with more!

This year the Show on 7 Sept had almost 200 exhibits with 24 people entering something, and both of those numbers are a slight increase on last year. It really was a very pleasant surprise for everyone given this year's erratic weather.

Refreshments were provided by the Bledlow Ridge WI who took just shy of £200 for their funds thanks to the attendee's consumption of tea/coffee and homemade cake.

The trophies were encouragingly spread out this year, showing that if you enter, you can win. Rosemary Harding won her first trophies with her Vegetable Collection, Sandra Claydon won with her Roses and Mags Terry with the best exhibit in Floral Art. Malcolm Gascoigne won the overall Fruit Classes, but Robin Eycott took the trophy for best Fruit Exhibit, and Les Terry took the Vegetable trophy. Julie Stringfellow won Domestics and she shared the trophy for Floral Art with Ros Hilborne who also won the overall Flower classes and the highest points in the combined Flower and Veg classes.

That left the trophies for the Fuschia classes and the "Best in Show" award which were won by Wendy Newell, the latter for her Aeonium in the Cactus/ Succulent class.

As always, our sincere thanks goes to all of those who supported the Show and it's preparation in some way, but especially to those who put in exhibits. Without them we would all have been standing looking at empty tables and the four independent judges sitting and twiddling their thumbs!

The 2nd XI did win its last game and finished 5th in their division. Bearing in mind how many cricketers as young as 13 have played this season this was some achievement. The Junior section has been a great success once again and their season was rounded off with a rousing Presentation Evening in early September.

In late August the club hosted a Presidents Day to which vice-presidents were invited. Some such as Chris and Lorna Newell travelled a long way to be with us. Although

it rained all day and there was no cricket (!) our guests thoroughly enjoyed their day and the excellent spread provided from the café by Martina.

By the time you read this we will have remembered James "HairBrear" Goodband at the club on 21st September, sharing great memories within the legacy of a refurbished pavilion gifted us by Nicky and Dom four years ago. The Annual Club Dinner and Prizegiving will take place at The Boot on Friday 18th October.

Thank you to all who have supported our club in various ways this summer. At the risk of omitting too many, this includes all the bar and BBQ teams, the café, umpires, scorers, those who work on the ground and many volunteers (including Humphrey who has set up the popular "Frogbox" live screening system each week). A hawker dragonfly emerged from the pond plants, rested a while, then was gone in a flash of silvery gossamer wings. Dragonflies were one of the first winged insects to evolve and fossils show them looking much as they do today but with giant wingspans. August brought sunny weather and a flurry of harvesting. Deer ran across the fields hurdling the lines of straw and a hare loped along the stubble, until balers gobbled up the straw and turned it into giant gold bars.

This year we saw more Jersey Tiger moths than usual, a sign that winter was mild so the caterpillars survived. They have exotic striped wings and rosy orange underwings which are revealed when they fly. Bullfinches made regular visits to our garden to feed on honeysuckle berries.

It has been traditional that Bradenham has had a village fete dating back to 1893 but with Covid and the absence of a permanent vicar, plus the uncertainty over the future of the Manor, this tradition unfortunately lapsed. Now, a small, robust group of Bradenham Residents are reinstating this important event bringing charities, community groups and businesses together in a safe and welcoming environment for everyone.

A dedicated events team consisting of residents are now working towards their goal of organising this important village fete for everyone to join in and enjoy. Already occasions such as car boot sales, afternoon tea and other fund-raising events have been held, with contributions also coming in from events such as last Spring's TIMELESS concert in the church and last Sunday's runners event, the Bradenham Blast. The Bradenham calendar too has proved an important and valuable project for the residents of Bradenham. Open to residents only, the best photos of Bradenham are selected to form a prestigous calendar on sale to the public. Last year's was aptly titled The Spirit of Bradenham. Income raised went to the beautiful St Botolph's church. This year, the calendar is entitled: Memorable Bradenham, with funds going to both the church and the fete. The team

are working hard to coordinate ideas and opinions so a continuous schedule of fundraising events can be held, leading up to the first fete in the summer of 2025 and hopefully into the future. Although not possible to be held at the moment in the grounds of the Manor, the National Trust have given permission for the Fete to be held on the Village Green and everyone is coming together to make the fete a terrific success

News from Parish Council

The Council met on September 9th in the Cricket Club. The following items may be of interest.

In addition to parish councillors, Cllr. Adoh from BCC was present, together with Neil Harris from The National Trust, and Squadron Leader Paul Armstrong from the RAF.

There will not be a town council in High Wycombe but the present arrangement with a town Committee will continue. The consultation indicated that residents did not wish to pay extra precept to cover running costs. People who need support during the winter months are advised to access the Bucks Council Website to find support.

Neil Harris (Countryside Manager) advised the PCC about progress on a number of local issues. The track on the way past the Cricket Club needs considerable funds spent to put it in good order. These are not available st present. Some levelling at the bottom of the track may be undertaken. Neil Harris agreed to deal with overhanging hedges of vacant properties on Bradenham Woods lane. The RAF is considering timers

on the existing street lighting when the lights are repaired/renewed.

The clerk has written to Country Supplies twice asking for the hedges to be cut back to allow wheelchairs and pushchairs to pass. If the latest deadline is exceeded, the Highways Enforcement Team will be informed.

The Council reviewed its policies for training and Financial regulations and adopted them. All policies are available on the Council's website.

BPC had objected to the demolition of Willow Barn but BC permitted it.

The accounts for the year to 09/09/24 were reviewed. The next meeting of the Council will be on Monday November 11th at 7pm. All welcome.

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Piddington

Robin Saunders - A Tribute



The cohesion of small village communities such as Piddington is invariably cultivated and maintained through the selfless efforts of a small number of individuals, who are well known to all. Very sadly, we recently lost a person who made such a key contribution to village life for so many years, with the passing of Robin Saunders who left us in July.

Annabel, Robin's daughter, sometimes called him the King of Piddington because he always seemed so involved in everything and knew everyone. But he said that he wasn't the King, he was just the caretaker. And he was probably right, he has always fixed things and rushed to help those who've needed it. Neighbours' burst pipes and other plumbing problems, broken down cars, fallen trees, leaking rooves, even medical emergencies.

Robin was a big believer in community. His litter-picking was legendary, enhanced by the abandoned bag of marijuana that he managed to sniff out on one memorable outing. He set up the weekly Piddington lunch club to bring people together and is many bread makers and slow cookers were fired up together to supply hot food and loaves for the lunches. Sizewell B power station was put on red alert for the expected surge in demand!

Working with the Piddington Horticultural Society he helped to organise many charitable fundraising meals at the village hall. A long-standing and most active member of the village hall committee, Robin was always willing and able to hang doors, fix lights, service the boiler and ensure the hall's smooth running, giving his time so freely.

Robin also helped to organise the annual Seniors' Christmas meal, was central at all of the street parties and was "Santa's bodydouble" for the Children's Christmas Party. Biodiversity Policy

Piddington and Wheeler End Parish Council adopted a Biodiversity Policy in June 2024. The objective of the Policy is to work towards conserving and enhancing the biodiversity in the parish.

The wildflower areas on Chipps Hill and Piddington Green are part of the support for the biodiversity policy. The Parish Council has been managing both areas for many years and wildflowers are flourishing.

There are three monitored wildflower areas on Piddington Green and 31 species have been identified. Very few of these species would be able to survive in a mown environment and they support an array of moths and butterflies.

A survey of Chipps Hill in July 2024 confirmed an incredible 103 different plant species.

The species list indicates that the site is classed as g2a lowland calcareous grassland. The site will need to be cut and collected again in autumn to further lower the nutrient levels and to remove encroaching scrub.

Dark Mullein and Kidney Vetch were in evidence, and these are the larval foodplants of the UK Biodiversity Action Plan priority species, the Striped Lychnis Moth and Small Blue Butterfly. UK BAP priority species are those that were identified as being the most threatened and requiring conservation action.

Wild Marjoram was far more abundant than last year especially in areas where dense scrub was removed last year. It is a very important plant in supporting pollinators.

Generally herbaceous wildflowers were more abundant this year at the site, this is likely due to the removal of encroaching scrub.

Some of the areas can look a bit scruffy at times, but they are vitally important to a multitude of flora and fauna species and there is enormous beauty within.

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

Lance Sharpe will commence his ministry on Sunday 1st December, Advent Sunday.

Revd. Lance and his wife Alison have been living in a very rural area of Wales for the last 12 years, where Revd. Lance has been ministering and overseeing the work of more churches than we have here in our

We will also consult Revd. Lance, once installed, about possibilities for disabled parking. Layout for the updated noticeboard is next on the list, as we hope to add the details of the new incumbent at the initial production stage. There are many more items to be discussed at our next P.C.C. meeting on 1st. October, but I'm sure you have enough to swallow for the time being!

News from West Wycombe Parish Council

We all hope that our neighbouring Parish Councils and their residents have had a really enjoyable summer and have had time to enjoy some well deserved rest and relaxation during some very

warm days of summer! The allotment holders of our parish have certainly not been in a supine postion during the balmy days of summer as they have been hard at work toiling on their allotments to produce an amazing variety of flowers, vegetables and fruit!

As the new Clerk for West Wycombe my 'learning curve' has been expotential as I grapple with the myriad of issues that Parish Clerks deal with and manage on a continual basis. However, I felt reassured that I wasn't alone as I struggle to come to grips with the role and its responsibilities when I read an article in the July edition of 'Clerk' published by the Society of Local Council Clerks and entitled 'A day in the life of' I would recommend reading the article to all Clerks

and their Councillors. One aspect of the article focuses on the unlimited amount of work solely undertaken by the role of Clerk and the summer months do not offer any respite to the volume of local issues that are dealt with on a continual basis by Clerks as lone workers.

The last news from the Parish Council described the theft and vandalism of our Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs within the

parish. Neighbouring Parish Councils have reported exactly the same type of thefts and vandalism of this type of equipment within their own parishes. In our individual case, the cost to replace the stolen batteries and the additional security measures for the vanalised units will be in excess of £600. The Parish Council now has to decide if using such equipment which may mitigate the problem of speeding vehicles on local roads versus the significant costs to replace batteries and undertake additional security measures for the equipment, offers value for money for our residents.

We are pleased to report that the churchyard of St Lawrence at the top of West Wycombe Hill has received some long overdue care and attention from the grounds contractor engaged by Buckinghamshire Coiuncil.

At the time of writing the pavement closures and the traffic control measures in the High Street in West Wycombe to allow for the external redecoration and restoration to some of the National Trust properties, will start to be withdrawn in late August, much to the relief of business owners who have been affected by the necessary restrictions on parking and access that were created. The Parish Council made the burial ground car park behind St Paul's Church available as alternative parking for residents during the period of the closures but this arrangement will cease to be in place after Monday 2 September 2024.

The Parish Council and its residents are understandably proud of their parish and one way that we continue to try to maintain the appearance of the parish and to protect the environment is to undertake regular 'Community Clean Up' litter picks which we would encourage rsidents and their families to take part in. The next litter pick is on Saturday 5 October 2024

starting at the West Wycombe Village Hall from 0930 with refreshments available at the end of your efforts!

Concern was expressed by Councillors at our September meeting with regard to the potential impact on some of our senior citizens as a result of the restrictions on some pensioners no longer being eligible for the Winter Fuel Payment. Age UK's Advice Line is a free, confidential national telephone service for older people, as well as their families, friends, carers and professionals. The Age UK team will give our senior citizens information that's reliable and up to date and help them access the advice they need if they concerned about meeting the cost of heating their homes this winter or any other challenges they may be facing.

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
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West Wycombe Preschool
